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
Confess And Repent

REFLECTION:

The prophecy of Isaiah speaks of a voice crying out in the desert to prepare the way of the Lord (cf. Is 40:3). This was fulfilled when "John the Baptist appeared in the desert proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins," (Mk 1: 4). This call is as

significant today as it was at the time of Christ. It is a fitting reminder to the faithful that to receive God's forgiveness, we should acknowledge our sinfulness, make straight our morally crooked ways, and smooth the rough edges of our character. We need God. Without Him we would not even exist. As St. Augustine wrote, "God created us without us; but He cannot save us without us."

On the 2nd Sunday of Advent our theme is - We prepare for Christ's coming when we repent and ask forgiveness of our sins, to transform our lives. Advent is the time to be still and to listen to God's word in preparation for His coming. The second reading tells us that "the Lord is patient, not wishing that any should perish but that all should come to



and to realize that God is all loving and forgiving. Desiring to know God is not enough. We must develop constant awareness of God's real presence in our life. To do so, we must repent and achieve transformation of the heart and mind by turning away from our sinfulness and invoking God's grace and mercy, so that we may produce good fruit, as witnessed through our thoughts, words and deeds. The fruit of true repentance is restoring our relationship with God that we lost by our sinfulness. Our hearts must be freed from our attachment to worldliness and unnecessary cares and worries, so that God can

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A Life Free From Sin Is Possible

The doctrine of the Immaculate Conception, defined by Pope Pius IX on December 8, 1854, states that "The Most Blessed Virgin Mary was, from the first instant of her conception, by a singular privilege and grace granted by God, in view of the merits of Jesus Christ, the Savior of the human race, preserved exempt from all stain of original sin" (Ineffabilis Deus).

For us as members of the Catholic faith, the Immaculate Conception is not just significant, it is essential. Because of the grace of God, Mary was preserved from sin. Because Mary was preserved from sin, she was prepared to become the sinless Mother of Jesus, who by his life, death and resurrection, has ransomed us from sin. Because of Mary's Immaculate Conception, because of her "yes" to God, we have been redeemed, and given the promise of eternal life through the merits of Mary's Son, Jesus.

Live In Moderation

This period of the liturgical year brings into the limelight the two figures who played a preemi-

nent role in the preparation for the historic coming of the Lord Jesus: the Virgin Mary and St John the Baptist. Mark's Gospel focuses on the latter... Starting with his external appearance, John is presented as a very ascetic figure: he was clothed in camel-skin and his food was locusts and wild honey that he found in the Judaean desert (cf. Mk 1:6).

Jesus himself once compared him to the people "in kings' houses" who are "clothed in soft raiment" (Mt 11: 8). John the Baptist's style must remind all Christians to opt for a lifestyle of moderation, especially in preparation for the celebration of the Christmas festivity, in which the Lord, as St. Paul would say, "though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich" (2 Cor 8:9).
