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Breaking The Barrier To God

REFLECTION:

The season of Advent is an opportune time to recall those occasions when we neglected to put Jesus at the center of our lives, when we disrespected Him in our thoughts, by our actions or inactions. We are asked to remember and recognize those times when we did not love others the way Jesus teaches us to love, failing to be His hands and feet to others and turning our backs to our Lord away from His grace and love. We are invited towards conversion of heart, to confess our

sins, and to resolve in avoiding temptations, with sincere and fervent penance to restore our lost relationship with God.

The message for the 2nd Sunday of Advent reminds us to repent and ask forgiveness for our sins as the best way to prepare for the Lord's second coming. Repentance is going back to the heart of God, admitting our weakness and our failure in fulfilling the commandment to love. We must return to His mercy and grace, knowing that He is the only One who brings healing to our sick souls and release us



from the bondage of sin. We encounter God's

power to forgive and His mighty arm of mercy in the sacrament of reconciliation through the priest who acts as the minister of His forgiving love. When the priest grants absolution, the penitent is set free of his offenses. He is using the authority entrusted by Christ to His Church by which sins are forgiven. Confession is the indispensable sacrament and font of God's grace in making our preparation for this season fruitful, meaningful and

complete.

Sadly, nowadays going to confession has lost its value and attraction to many people. It is noticeable that present-day society is losing the "sense of sin." We learn that many countries have legalized divorce and some are making laws which circumvent the preservation of the unborn fetus. More and more countries are permitting same sex marriages. These horrible offenses against God, nature and humanity are no longer considered morally wrong

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
Welcome The Word Who Saves

the Flock John the Baptist is described as "the voice of one crying in the wilderness: Prepare the way for the Lord, make his paths straight" (Lk 3:4). The voice proclaims the word, but in this case the Word of God comes first, since the word of God came to John, the son of Zechariah, in the wilderness (cf. Lk 3:2). He therefore plays an important role but always in terms of Christ. St Augustine comments: "John is the voice, but the Lord is the Word who was in the beginning (cf. Jn 1:1). John is the voice that lasts for a time; from the beginning Christ is the Word who lives for ever. Take away the word, the meaning, and what is the voice? Where there is no understanding, there is only a meaningless sound. The voice without the word strikes the ear but does not build up the heart" (In ev. Johannis tractatus 293, 3: pl 38, 1328).

Today it is up to us to listen to that voice so as to make room for Jesus, the Word who saves us, and to welcome him into our hearts. Let us prepare ourselves in this Season of Advent to see, with the eyes of faith in the humble Grotto of Bethlehem, God's salvation (cf. Lk 3:6). In the consumer society in which we are tempted to seek joy in things, the Baptist teaches us to live in an essential manner, so that Christmas may be lived not only as an external feast, but as the feast of the Son of God who came to bring men and women peace, life and true joy.

Let us entrust our journey to encounter the Lord who comes, to the motherly intercession of Mary, the Virgin of Advent, in order to be ready to receive, in our heart and in our whole life, the Emmanuel, God-with-us.
