Imitate The Servant King

REFLECTION:

"The greatest among you must be your servant," (Mt 23: 11). This is the benchmark which our Lord Jesus has set for all of us, especially for those who are called to leadership, in rendering service to others. Our theme for this week captures the true essence of serving – We

imitate and witness the life of Christ the King by honoring and serving Him in humility. Like Jesus, leading is serving because He came to serve and not to be served.

Following the leadership example of Jesus means that those who are in authority should lead in humility, obedience and commitment, rather than being immersed in self-entitlement, self-empowerment and selfish interest. In the first reading. God showed His displeasure to the priests because their position has made them contemptible, serving for their vain glory, away from the path of faith which no longer gives glory and honor to Him. "You have turned aside from the way, and have caused many to falter...you do not keep my ways, but



show partiality in your decisions," (Mal 1:8-9).

The gospel presents to us a vivid contrast between the arrogant and selfimportant behavior of the religious leaders and the humble attitude of Jesus. He warns us about hypocrisy and conceit as He had rebuked

them. "The scribes and the Pharisees have taken their seat...do and observe all things whatsoever they tell you, but do not follow their example," (Mt 23: 2-3). Leaders are expected to lead by example, not to consider themselves as the center of authority and honor. Jesus emphasizes that service is about purity of intention, consistent with living a holy life, respecting others and doing the right thing for God's glory.

Jesus lived among us to show us the way of total love and service. He did not come to impose Himself on us, though He is God, but showed us the example of a gentle, loving and compassionate Servant King. He chose lowly and humble people like Peter and gave him the authority of His Church. Together with other apostles, they were giv-

Jesus of Nazareth, Doubleday, New York, 2007, p. 66). He is our true and only Teacher! 'The first teacher trains all the other teachers, as he also trains the same disciples themselves, because they exist only in virtue of that first tacit, but very powerful Magisterium" (Idea della Sapienza, 82, in: Introduzione alla filosofia, vol. II, Rome, 1934, 143). Jesus also firmly condemns vanity and observes that "deeds to be seen by men" (Mt 23:5), places them at the mercy of human approval, undermining the values that found the authenticity of

en the mission to lead the people of God with wisdom and to witness to all what Jesus showed them, pleasing to God. "...the Kingdom of God is ... a matter of righteousness, peace and joy in the Holy Spirit; whoever serves Christ in this way is pleasing to God and approved by others" (Rom 14: 17-18).

Leaders in ministry today should have and live a faith-filled attitude whose character is likened to that of Jesus Christ. "Have among yourselves the same attitude that is in Christ Jesus...He emptied Himself, taking the form of a slave..." (Phil 2: 5, 7). Their person, their words, actions,

treatment of others and inspiring leadership lead people nearer to God. They are called to keep the vision of God's kingdom ever alive. Leadership in the Church will be truly life-giving when it internally reflects a service modeled after the Good Shepherd who serves out of love to His flock.

It is clear that Jesus rejects leaders who are prone to focus on themselves, who think only about themselves and to exalt themselves, boasting on their achievements and spirituality. It has always been said that those who seek prestige will find shame, and those who seek humility will find honor.

The Lord tells us that in all that

we do, we do it for the greater glory of God. For this, He gives us this assurance, "Whoever exalts himself will be humbled: but whoever humbles himself will be exalted," (Mt 23: 12).
