Faithful And Fruitful

REFLECTION:

"I have chosen you from the world to go and bear fruit that will remain," (Jn 15: 16). The readings this week should instill in us that God expects abundant fruit from us because of the generous gift of love and trust He has lavished us with. Everything comes from God be-

cause He is our Creator, who molded us to His likeness. All that we have belongs to Him. Every blessing He has given us comes from Him alone. But what will He see when He comes? Will He reap a good harvest and bear Him good fruit? Or, to His dismay we become "wild grapes" like the unfaithful tenants who yielded nothing but "bloodshed and outcry" for justice?

Being a Christian who lives a spiritually fruitful life is the only way to please, glorify and thank God for all His goodness. He designed us to be like Him and to thrive when we are humble, moral and grateful. And yet, what have become of us? How have we responded to God's generosity and gratuitous love, His trust and forgiveness to us as a nation, as community and as individuals?




Our stubbornness and hard-heartedness prevent us from seeing God as the source of our gifts. When pride blinds a person, he becomes insensitive and he feels he does not owe gratitude to anyone. He is convinced of his superiority and tells himself that everything he has is due to his own efforts. Be-

ing human, people love their own glory and forget to glorify God, to thank Him and express their gratitude. We should not be like those whom St. Paul reproached, "What do you possess that you have not received? But if you have received it, why are you boasting as if you did not receive it?" (1Cor 4:7).

Genuine gratitude glorifies God because it admits that we need Him. Those who are grateful recognize the presence of God in their life. When we live our lives in holiness, doing the will of God, trusting and remaining faithful, humbly obeying every command that He tells us, we demonstrate our gratefulness to God as a fruitful servant. A faithful heart is a thankful heart who believes in God's presence. Jesus' healing of the ten lepers gives an example of how he values thankfulness. He showed his




Silence
