REFLECTION:

Viva Cristo Rey! The Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus, King of the Universe (Christ the King) is the last Sunday of the liturgical year, the culmination of the Ordinary

Time leading to the Advent Season. In our reflection for this week, we are enjoined to ask ourselves, 'Is Jesus the King of my life?' Our theme this week – We imitate and witness the life of Christ the King by living a righteous life and caring for the last, the least and the lost, guides us on how we should conduct our life in order that we may confidently declare that Jesus is truly the King of our lives.

In the 1st reading, we see our God in the image of a good and caring shepherd. As a good shepherd of the flock, he spends considerable time looking after his own sheep that strayed away and brings them back to the fold. From the Prophet Ezekiel, God tells us, "I will rescue them from every place where they were scattered...The lost I will seek out, the strayed I will bring back,



the injured I will bind up, the sick I will heal..." (Ez 34: 12b, 16a).

In the 2nd reading, in his letter to the Corinthians, St. Paul presents a powerful and awesome picture of Christ as Lord

and King, "For just as in Adam all die, so too in Christ shall all be brought to life... For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under His feet," (1 Cor 22a, 25). Christ represents life, life in all its fullness. And that is the life that He wants all of us to have. In other verses in Scriptures, Jesus declares that "It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick," (Lk 5:31-32), and "the Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve," (Mt 20: 28).

As Christ's followers, we are expected to go out of our way and reach out in love to those in need – the hungry, the thirsty, the stranger, the poor and naked, the sick and those in prison. They are the people who need to experience our love, they are the most in need of transformation that their lives may turn around for the better. We



"And he will separate them one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats." each one may receive recompense, according to what he did in the body. whether good or evil," (2 Cor 5:10).

The gospel is very clear that our actions towards the last, the least and the lost will be the basis of Christ's judgment, whether we have cared for them or ignored them. Jesus declares, "Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of the least brothers of mine, you did for me, (Mt 25:40)... "What you did not do for one of these least ones, you did not do for me," (Mt 25:45).

As our Good Shepherd and Servant King, Jesus is merciful and compassionate. But He is also a just God. "As for you my sheep, says the Lord God, I will judge between one sheep and another, between rams and goats," (Ez 34:17). He cares for us while we journey through life. He accompanies us in our walk towards holiness and discipleship which we
