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Life Is About Balance

REFLECTION:

We as disciples of Jesus, are called to help establish God's kingdom in two components. First is seeking, listening, and communing with God. Secondly, putting it into action.

In the Gospel, the character of Mary and Martha, point out to us the two parts of our Christian life. Mary representing our contemplative life, our life of prayer and communion with God. And Mar-

tha who represents the apostolic life, service to God and others. Both aspects of spiritual life are essential. Every disciple must not only spend time in loving service, but such must be together with prayerful meditation on the word of God and constant reflection on the teachings and examples of Jesus. In other words, we need to find a unity and balance in living a deep life of prayer and having a zealous apostolic life in service.

Martha's character is hospitable, a person who loves to serve and attend to



others needs. But busyness in her service took the best out of her. And because she's missing out on the presence of Jesus, her activity developed anxiety and distraction. That's where the problem lies. It is not in the service. It's in the way she's serving. She's filled with anxiety, and she is distracted. In contrast to Mary who has her eves totally on Jesus.

On the other hand, as much as we like to

be in the presence of Jesus always, God doesn't call us to simply pray and go along with our day. Prayer is not an excuse to be lazy, and not take responsibility for anything. That is another trap entirely. According to saint James, we are to be doers of the Word, and not hearers only! Prayers are our marching orders. They help us align ourselves with the actions God wants us to take. Pope Francis stated: you pray for the hungry then you feed them. This is how prayer works.

The Only Thing Not Passing Away

Martha and Mary are two sisters; they also have a brother, Lazarus... Jesus is passing through their village and... when Jesus has been made comfortable, Mary sits at his feet and listens to him while Martha is totally absorbed by her many tasks, certainly due to the special Guest.

We seem to see the scene: one sister bustling about busily and the other, as it were, enraptured by the presence of the Teacher and by his words. A little later Martha... can no longer resist and complains, even feeling that she has a right to criticize Jesus: "Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me to serve alone? Tell her then to help me". Martha would even like to teach the Teacher! Jesus on the other hand answers her very calmly: "Martha, Martha", and the repetition of her name expresses his affection, "you are anxious and troubled about many things; only one thing is needful. Mary has chosen the good portion, which shall not be taken away from her" (Lk 10: 41-42). Christ's words are quite clear: there is no contempt for active life, nor even less for generous hospitality; rather, a distinct reminder of the fact that the only really necessary thing is something else: listening to the word of the Lord; and the Lord is there at that moment, present in the Person of Jesus! All the rest will pass away and will be taken from us but the word of God is eternal and gives meaning to our daily actions.

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mark of discipleship. It is a very fundamental virtue and as shown by Abraham and Sarah in the first reading. It is a way of expressing our love for God and neighbor. It should come from a heart overflowing with Jesus' love which we develop by studying His Word. Jesus would rather have you sitting at His feet while He feeds you before you go out in the world to perform acts of service in His name. We see from this story; Jesus desires the worship of Mary and the work of Martha in the correct balance!

However, let us be honest with ourselves, there is a Martha in every one of us, but we often do not see it. I for one is also guilty of it. When we are caught up with our many pressing concerns and activities within and outside of our homes, our families, and even our communities, our hearts and minds lose focus. We for-

get that our priority is the Lord, and we end up stressed, anxious, bitter, sometimes resentful, and judgmental of the people around us. We grumble and complain and fail to see and hear Jesus in our midst.

Jesus warns us against an active ministry that is lacking in spiritual input and enlightenment. Instead, He is reminding us to balance it with attentiveness to Him and to His words. And so, while working, we can add praying so that there is guidance, enlightenment, inspiration, and strength from God. A quotation says, "When man works, it is only man who works. But when man prays, God works." In other words, when prayer is added in our work, we are confident that God will help us finish our work successfully and fruitfully. There will no more worries, stress, and anxieties.

Yes, brothers and sisters in

Christ, we need to have a balance between rest and activity, between prayer and service, between listening to Christ and serving Christ in others. Jesus' life was about prayer and service. He retired to the desert to pray but then he came back to preach and to heal. Mary sat and listened to Jesus and Martha actively served Him. And so, amid the busyness of life are you stopping to listen to Jesus, taking time for prayer and rest and meditating on God's word like Mary? Are you merely living like busy Martha? Life is about balance.

And lastly, as we go forward, let us find ways to grow in a life of prayer which will give fuel to our apostolic life so that we will grow in love of God and others in our day-to day activities. And let our service to God and others continue to support and increase our life of prayer.
